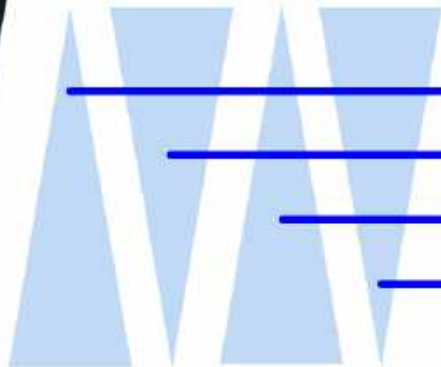






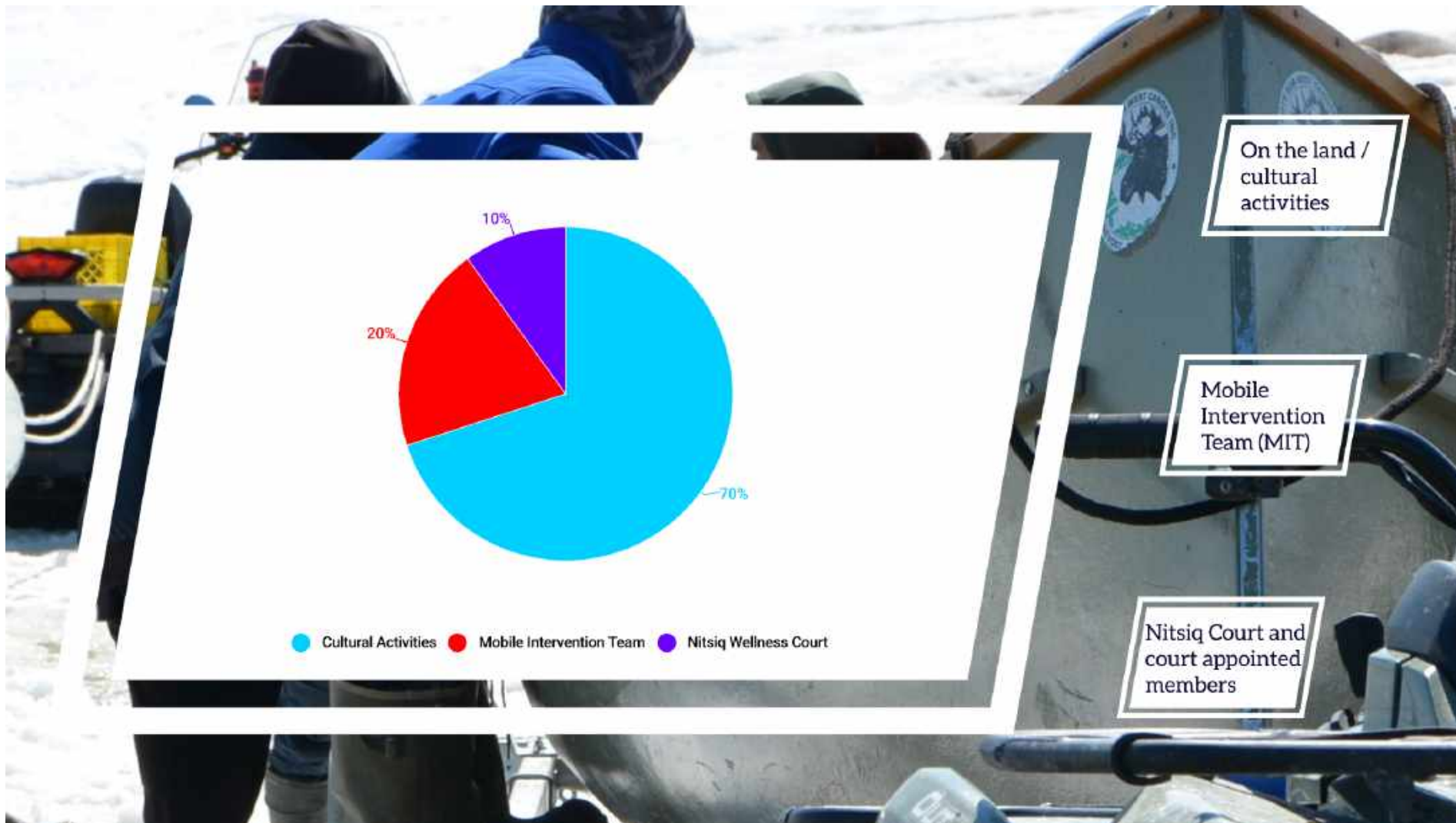

## Nitsiq Wellness Court

- officially started in September 2019
- first guest suggested in October 2019
- from October to when he left for Portage in December, the guest worked with the Saqijuq Educators doing on the land activities
- November 2019 guest officially a Nitsiq guest
- December 2019 went to Portage to begin treatment

## Action Plan (2015) successes

- the first official action plan was accepted in 2015
- the action plan explained what Saqijuq was, the reasoning for Saqijuq, and a draft summary action plan
- within the action plan were 11 objectives, of which 8 are successfully implemented - according to the needs and desires of the community
- objectives we are still working to complete include:
  - Implementation of a "sobering-up center"
  - Improve the supply of detox and addiction treatment services in Nunavik - we are actively working on this (as well as improving access to services outside of Nunavik)
  - increase availability and quality of psychosocial services offered
- improve collaboration among organizations - still difficult and can be quite destructive to the advancement of projects. We are all working together so should not be afraid of collaborating with each other.

## Where We Stand

Puvirnituq is operational and working on its own.

Nitsiq Wellness Court has started and we have a coordinator to assist with the paperwork, etc.

At the end of January 2020, a Facebook page for Saqijuq was started.

Kangirsuk has started. There is a Team Leader, office space, and money is in place to begin.

At the Regional Partnership Committee meeting held in January, Akulivik was chosen as the 3rd community to begin Saqijuq (should Akulivik be willing). Meetings will be set up soon.

- regardless of how "fast" people would like to be implemented, sometimes slower is a bit better. It allows us to proceed with a better grasp of what is needed for next communities.

- even with the engagement of the community, staffing can be an issue

### Benefit 1

- presently reaching between 40-60 youth and adults a month
- this allows them the opportunity to learn new skills, strengthen their identity, and become stronger





## Benefit 2

- court appointed clients are able to work with Saqijuq while waiting for their cases to come to court - thus reducing the amount of Inuit detained, increase their cultural identity, and
- are able to perform their community service in a way which benefits them as well as their community



### Benefit 3

- contributing to the wellness of the community by providing country food to those who may not be able to hunt
- perform other activities to contribute to the community - such as the on the land clean up









## The Action Plan

Have our own office and garage set up at their new location  
Have Nitsiq Wellness Court receive more guests

Have Kangirsuk start, in collaboration with Makitautik  
Have the coordinator work with the Project Managers, as well as Puvirnituk Post and hire the educators

Fall (Spring) begin speaking with Akulivik, in collaboration with Inuulitsivik, Social Services, KRPF.

Confirm funding for building of camps, continuation of MIT (Police Officers salaries) from a source other than Saqijuq.

## Budget

The main monetary source for 2020 (calendar year) is Ungaluk. We have increased our request as the ACCESS OM funds end this year so we needed to ensure we have funds for our educators. ACCESS OM assisted in the acquiring of the workshop in Puvirnituq and has covered the majority of the educator's salaries.

We also have confirmed funding from Minister of Public Security (Federal). It is a 5-year agreement and ends in 2023 (fiscal year). This money has been received and is for Puvirnituq so as we expand new requests will have to be made.

Saqijjuq is under the responsibility of the Regional Partnership Committee (RPC), but the NRHSS supports Saqijjuq administratively. It also supports various initiatives promoted when additional funding may be needed.

Received money from the Law Foundation of Ontario to complete an evaluation in regards to the Justice aspect.

## Step 1

Build a camp between Puvirnituq and Akulivik.

Working to secure funding for 3 buildings to be built in 2020 (arrange for items to arrive by sealift).

Can be used by both communities as a place for those to go who have been released from detention, return from treatment, and not have a safe or comfortable place. Will also be used for regular camp activities - with Elders and Saqijug team.

## Step 2

### 3rd MIT training

Will be given in Kuujjuaq. The first two trainings contained more of a "police" base, but this will have a more "social" component. A representative from the MIT, as well as a representative from the NRBHSS will meet with the ENPQ to have the training more accurately represent our needs.

It will take place in May and will be open to KRPF officers, Social Workers, from both coasts, as well as other players who could benefit.
